What to Do

If you are thinking about leaving a gift to PTSD Resolution in your Will, the best thing to do is see your solicitor or accredited will writer. They will be able to advise you how to write or amend your Will, and how to make a legacy to PTSD Resolution.

There are a number of ways you might want to remember PTSD Resolution in your Will, but these are the main ones:

1. Pecuniary legacy, when you leave a specific sum, such as £1,000, to a beneficiary.
2. Residuary legacy, when you leave all or part of the residue, that is what remains after all other distribution.

What to Say

The following is some suggested wording:

1. Pecuniary. "I bequeath to PTSD Resolution, Meadow Cottage, Poundfield Road, Chalvington, Sussex, BN27 3TH, registered charity number 1133188, the sum of £....., to be used by PTSD Resolution at its discretion. I further declare that the receipt from the PTSD Resolution Accountant, or other proper officer, shall be a full and sufficient discharge to my executor."
2. Residuary (all). "I further direct that the residue of my estate should be bequeathed to PTSD Resolution, Meadow Cottage, Poundfield Road, Chalvington, Sussex, BN27 3TH, registered charity number 1133188, to be used by PTSD Resolution at its discretion. I further declare that the receipt by the PTSD Resolution Accountant, or other proper officer, shall be a full and sufficient discharge to my executor."
3. Residuary (part) "I further direct that the residue of my estate should be divided into specified numbered parts, and each bequeathed to:
charity A: PTSD Resolution, Meadow Cottage, Poundfield Road, Chalvington, Sussex, BN27 3TH, registered charity number 1133188, to be used by PTSD Resolution at its discretion. I further declare that the receipt by the PTSD Resolution Accountant, or other proper officer, shall be a full and sufficient discharge to my executor."

charity C.
4. Residuary (entire). "I direct that my entire estate should be divided according to the following instructions and bequeathed as follows:
X % to PTSD Resolution, Meadow Cottage, Poundfield Road, Chalvington, Sussex, BN27 3TH registered charity number 1133188
Y % to Beneficiary
Z % to Beneficiary
